

Long Term Medical Conditions and Administration of Medication Policy

Introduction

Alamiyah school is an inclusive community that supports and welcomes pupils with medical conditions. It provides pupils with medical conditions with the same opportunities and access to activities in and out of school as other pupils. Arrangements for each pupil's medical conditions will be made in partnership with parents and medical professionals where appropriate. This policy will outline how the school meets the needs of children with long-term medical conditions including diabetes, epilepsy, asthma, anaphylaxis and other allergies.

Aims

- To ensure that the School has a robust approach to the care of pupils with long term medical conditions and for the management of their medical needs whilst at the school.
- To ensure that the administration of medication is managed in a robust way according to the individual needs of the child.
- To ensure that the school partners with parents to provide the best care and education for any pupil with a long term medical condition

Approach

The school will ensure that:

- It listens to the views of pupils and parents
- All staff understand the medical conditions of pupils at this school and that they may be serious, and adversely affect a child's quality of life and impact on their ability to learn
- All staff understand their duty of care to children and young people and know what to do in the event of an emergency
- The level of care meets the child's needs
- Pupils and parents feel confident in the care they receive from this school
- All staff understand and support the policy
- All staff understand that pupils with the same medical condition will not have the same needs



The school recognises that duties in the Children and Families Act (England only), the Equality Act (England, Wales and Scotland) and the Disability Discrimination Act (Northern Ireland only) relate to children with disability or medical conditions are anticipatory.

Long Term Medication

If a child requires long term medication; for example, asthma pumps, eczema creams or emergency medication for conditions like epilepsy etc. the parent must complete the **Administration of Medication Form** before the medication can be administered.

A GP prescribed medication must be provided by the parent with the original label from the pharmacy detailing the full name of the child, date of birth, the dosage and times of administration. The medication should also be labelled with the issue date and expiry date.

If a child requires emergency medication the parent fills in an **Emergency Medical Agreement** which states details about the pupil's medical condition, signs and symptoms and what to do in an emergency.

Additionally, pupils with serious long term illnesses such as epilepsy, diabetes or allergies which require emergency life saving medication such as an epi pen will have a more detailed **Healthcare Plan**. The Healthcare Plan outlines important additional information including, for example, special dietary requirements, important modifications to the school routines or activities, risk factors and how to mitigate them, and any other important relevant information or considerations.

Short Term Medication

Children on short term medicine may be brought to the school if they are well enough to attend at the discretion of the Headteacher. However, children who are unwell should not be brought to school and therefore short term medicines, for example, calpol, antibiotics are not generally administered at the school. Each case is treated individually depending on the circumstance and therefore considered on a case by case basis. No child would be excluded on the basis of their health or medical needs.



Emergencies for Pupils with Medical Conditions

- All school staff, including temporary or supply staff, are aware of the medical conditions of pupils within their care.
- All staff are trained in what to do in the event of an emergency for children with medical conditions
- All staff understand their duty of care to pupils in an emergency
- All staff receive training in what to do in an emergency and this is refreshed at least once a year
- All children with a medical condition have an emergency healthcare plan, which explains what help they need in an emergency. The Emergency Healthcare Plan will accompany a pupil should they need to attend hospital.
- All staff understand and are trained in the school's general emergency procedures
- All staff, including temporary or supply staff, know what action to take in an emergency and receive updates at least yearly.

If a child does require life saving medication to be administered in an emergency:

A trained member of staff MUST administer the medication with a second member of staff as a support and another member of staff must dial 999 immediately whilst the rest of the staff supervise the other children and keep them calm.

- Staff without this training are not insured to administer life saving medication and MUST NOT administer it since this could put the child's life at further risk.
- If there is risk of death from the condition of the child, the local hospital will be informed that the child is with us.

Administration of Medication

Alamiyah recognises the importance of administering medication according to the agreed care plan for each pupil. The School will ensure:

- that staff will receive training on this condition and how to administer their medication from a trained healthcare professional.
- that there are several members of staff who have been trained to administer the medication



and meet the care needs of an individual child

- that there are sufficient numbers of staff trained to cover any absences, staff turnover and other contingencies.
- that there is the appropriate level of insurance and liability cover in place
- it will not give medication (prescription or non-prescription) to a pupil without a parent's written consent except for life saving medication in the case of an emergency.
- it will check the maximum dosage and when the previous dose was given
- parents will be informed of any medication given.
- that a trained member of staff is available to accompany a pupil with a medical condition on an off-site visit, including overnight stays

Storage of Medication and Equipment

The school will ensure that

- · medication is stored out of reach of pupils in an unlocked cabinet
- each pupil's medication will be placed in a box with the child's full name, date of birth and photograph on it.
- All medical care plans and documentation will remain in the pupil's medication box
- medication is administered by a trained member of staff.
- · all staff understand what constitutes an emergency for an individual child
- emergency medication/equipment is readily available wherever the child is in the school and on off-site activities, and is not locked away
- Staff can administer a controlled drug to a pupil once they have had specialist training
- medication is in date and labelled in its original container where possible, in accordance with
 its instructions. The exception to this is insulin, which though must still be in date, will generally
 be supplied in an insulin injector pen or a pump
- Parents are asked to collect all medications/equipment after they have expired
- Parents are asked to provide new and in-date medication at least one month prior to the expiry date of the old medication.
- all needles and other sharps are disposed of safely in line with local policies
- Sharps boxes are kept securely at school and will accompany a child on off-site visit
- they are collected and disposed of in line with local authority procedures.



Record Keeping

Parents at this school are asked if their child has any medical conditions on their registration form. If the child has a long term medical condition or allergy then an emergency medical agreement is and administration of medication form is filled in to record the support an individual pupil needs around their medical condition.

If a pupil has a condition such as anaphylaxis, diabetes or epilpsy, an Emergency Heathcare Plan is developed with the parent, school staff, specialist nurse (where appropriate) and relevant healthcare services if available. This school has a centralised register of Emergency Healthcare Plans and emergency healthcare agreements, and an identified member of staff has the responsibility for this register.

All plans and agreements are regularly reviewed, at least once a year or whenever the pupil's needs change.

All school staff are made aware of and have access to the Emergency Healthcare Plan or Agreements for the pupils in their care. Pupil's confidentiality is protected since paperwork is stored away from any unauthorised personnel according to GDPR, The school seeks permission from parents before sharing any medical information with any other party.

The school keeps an accurate record of all medication administered, including the dose, time, date and supervising staff. This school makes sure that all staff providing support to a pupil have received suitable training and ongoing support, to make sure that they have confidence to provide the necessary support and that they fulfil the requirements set out in the pupil's Emergency Medical Agreement or Healthcare plan.

All training will be provided by a specialist nurse, qualified medical professional and/or the parent. The specialist nurse/school nurse/other suitably qualified healthcare professional will confirm their competence, and this school keeps an up-to-date record of all training undertaken and by whom.



Inclusive Environment for Pupils with Medical Conditions.

The environment at Alamiyah will be inclusive for pupils with medical conditions and includes the physical environment, as well as social, sporting and educational activities. Alamiyah is committed to:

- providing a physical environment accessible to pupils with medical conditions and pupils are consulted to ensure this accessibility
- an accessible physical environment for out-of-school activities
- ensuring that the needs of pupils with medical conditions are adequately considered so that
 they are involved in structured and unstructured activities, extended school activities and
 residential visits.
- help prevent and deal with any problems that may arise in social situations or in lessons at school due to the pupil's medical condition. Teachers use opportunities such as PSHE and science lessons to raise awareness of medical conditions to help promote a positive environment.
- ensuring that all pupils take part in physical activity and that all relevant staff make appropriate
 adjustments to physical activity sessions to make sure they are accessible to all pupils. This
 includes out-of-school clubs and team sports.

The school:

- understands that pupils should not be forced to take part in activities if they are unwell
- is aware of pupils who have been advised to avoid/take special precautions during activity
- is aware that there are potential triggers for a pupil's medical condition when exercising and how to minimise these
- ensures that pupils have the appropriate medication/equipment/food with them during physical activity
- makes sure that pupils with medical conditions can participate fully in all aspects of the curriculum and enjoy the same opportunities at school as any other child, and that appropriate adjustments and extra support are provided
- understands that frequent absences, or symptoms, such as limited concentration and frequent tiredness, may be due to a pupil's medical condition.
- will not penalise pupils for their attendance if their absences relate to their medical condition.



Management of Medical Conditions

- The school is aware of the common triggers that can make common medical conditions worse or can bring on an emergency.
- The school is actively working towards reducing or eliminating these health and safety risks and has a written schedule of reducing specific triggers to support this.
- The school is committed to identifying and reducing triggers both at school and on out-ofschool visits.
- School staff have been given training and written information on medical conditions which includes avoiding/reducing exposure to common triggers.
- The Emergency Agreement/Healthcare Plan details an individual pupil's triggers and details
 how to make sure the pupil remains safe throughout the whole school day and on
 out-of-school activities.
- Risk assessments are carried out on all out-of-school activities, taking into account the needs
 of pupils with medical needs

Review

This policy will be reviewed every 3 years or sooner if an emergency arises which calls for a review in the policy or if there is any change in statutory guidance or legislation. See 'Policy Review Schedule'.
